The fast fashion industry

Fast fashion refers to the production of inexpensive clothing collections that are quickly manufactured to keep up with the latest trends. This model emphasizes rapid turnover of designs and frequent updates to stores, enabling retailers to quickly respond to changing fashion trends and consumer demands. Fast fashion brands often prioritize low costs, quick production, and high-volume sales. However, this model has raised concerns about its environmental impact, labor practices, and the disposable nature of the clothing it produces.

The term was coined by the New York Times in 1990, when the retail store Zara first landed in the United States. The retail brand's goal was to take only 15 days for a garment to go from the design stage to being sold in stores.

Some of the factors that collectively contribute to the popularity of fast fashion are the following:

Affordability: Fast fashion brands offer trendy clothing at low prices, making fashion accessible to a broader audience. This affordability allows consumers to frequently update their wardrobes without breaking the bank.

Trend responsiveness: Fast fashion retailers are adept at quickly identifying and capitalizing on emerging fashion trends. They can rapidly produce and distribute clothing that aligns with the latest styles, allowing consumers to stay on-trend without waiting for traditional fashion cycles and providing them with instant gratification.

Social media influence: Social media platforms like Instagram and TikTok play a significant role in promoting fast fashion trends. Influencers and celebrities showcase these brands' clothing, driving demand among their followers and creating a sense of urgency to purchase.

Peer pressure: In some cases, social pressure or the desire to fit in with peers can drive consumers to embrace fast fashion. The fear of being perceived as outdated or unfashionable may motivate individuals to continuously update their wardrobes with the latest trends.

While fast fashion offers affordability and accessibility to consumers, its negative impacts on the environment, labor rights, and social well-being raise significant ethical concerns. To keep the price of production down, fast fashion pieces are often made with non-renewable, and non-biodegradable materials like polyester that take a long time to decompose. To make matters worse, fast fashion contributes to a waste generation of consumers who frequently discard clothing items after only a few wears due to their low quality or changing trends. Not only does the fast fashion industry rely on cheap materials, it heavily relies on cheap exploitative labor practices such as child employment and unsafe working conditions. Last but not least, the fast fashion industry perpetuates a culture of overconsumption and commodification as it encourages consumers to constantly buy new clothing and do away with old ones.

All in all, the consequences of fast fashion extend beyond the fashion industry itself and impact various aspects of society, the economy, and the environment. Addressing these issues requires conscious awareness of the need for greater sustainability and ethical responsibility from governments, the clothing industry and consumers.

Fit

Past tense: fitted (also fit AmE).

Use fit to say that clothes are not too big or too small! Use suit to say that clothes look attractive on someone. That dress fits, but it doesn't suit me.

Match

(no preposition)

One thing matches another or two things match.

If one thing matches another or if two things match, they look attractive together because they are a similar colour, pattern, etc. Her dress matched her shoes.

Look the same: two things that match look the same because they are a pair: Your socks don't match.

Well-matched / ill-matched: a well-matched pair.

Put on/off

Something (phrasal verb): to put a piece of clothing on your body (\neq take off). He took off his uniform and put on a sweater and trousers. / I'll have to put my glasses on; I can't read the sign from here.

On skin: to put make up, cream, etc. on your face. I've got to put this cream on twice a day.

Weight/ 12lbs / 4kg: to become fatter and heavier. Rosie's put on five kilos since she quit smoking.

Suit

Clothes / clolours that suit you mak you look attractive. That coat really suits Paul. / Red suits you. / Jill's new hairstyle doesn't really suit her.








Image 18. A Very Important Person to me: Brainstorming.

Taylor Alison Swift was born on December 13, 1989, in Reading, Pennsylvania. She grew up on a Christmas tree farm with her parents, Scott and Andrea Swift, and her younger brother, Austin. Her maternal grandmother, Marjorie Finlay, was a professional opera singer and television star. At the age of 11, Taylor won a local talent competition by singing a rendition of LeAnn Rimes' "Big Deal". A year later, she began writing her own songs and learnt to play the guitar. At the age of 14, she moved to Nashville, Tennessee to pursue a career in country music.

The singer-songwriter released her self-titled debut album in 2006, which showcased her talent as a songwriter and performer. The album included hits such as "Tim McGraw" and "Teardrops on My Guitar," which led her to fame in the country music scene. Her subsequent albums, "Fearless" (2008) and "Speak Now" (2010), earned her widespread acclaim and numerous awards.

In 2012, Swift transitioned towards pop music with her album "Red," which featured the album's lead single "We Are Never Ever Getting Back Together." This album marked a significant shift in her musical style as it incorporated elements of pop, rock and electronic music while still incorporating elements of her country roots. The album was followed by "1989", which was released in 2014 and consolidated her status as a pop superstar, with hits like "Shake It Off" and "Blank Space."

What makes her an outstanding artist is her ability to connect deeply with audiences through her

lyrics characterized by autobiographical storytelling, often drawing from her personal experiences and relationships. Additionally, Swift is known for using social media to advocate for artists' rights and causes such as gender equality and LGBTQ+ rights.

Swift's impact has gone beyond music as she has ventured into acting, with roles in films like "Valentine's Day" (2010) and "The Giver" (2014). She has also become involved in various philanthropic endeavors, including donating to disaster relief efforts and supporting education initiatives.

With numerous awards, record-breaking albums, and sold-out tours to her name, Taylor Swift remains one of the most influential figures in the music industry. All throughout her career, she has consistently reinvented herself while maintaining her authenticity as an artist all of which has gained her a huge audience of loyal fans who follow her blindly everywhere.




Image 21. Taylor Swift Timeline.





At the age of 17, he began his university education at University College, Oxford, where he was awarded a first-class honors degree in natural science in 1962. After Oxford, he began his graduate work
at Trinity Hall, Cambridge, where he got his PhD degree in physics in 1966.
He attended Byron House School in Highgate, London, and later St. Albans School in Hertfordshire after the family moved there when he was eight years old. From a young age, Hawking showed a keen interest in how things worked. He loved to take apart clocks and radios to see how they functioned.
Stephen William Hawking was born on January 8, in 1942, in Oxford, England. He is one of the most famous scientists of the 21st century as he made significant contributions to the understanding of

and his mother, Eileen Isobel Walker Hawking, was a political activist. He had two younger sisters, Philippa and Mary, and an adopted brother, Edward.
Despite the terrible diagnosis, Hawking continued his research and went on to make significant contributions to the field of theoretical physics and cosmology. In 1968, he became a member of the Institute of Astronomy at Cambridge. The subsequent years proved to be highly productive for his research. He was obsessed with the study of time and space and wrote his famous book <i>A Brief History of Time: From the Big Bang to Black Holes</i> , where he explored the origin, development and eventual fate of the universe.
At the age of 21, Hawking received a diagnosis of amyotrophic lateral sclerosis (ALS), a neurodegenerative disease that affects motor neurons. Doctors gave him a life expectancy of two years, but he lived more than fifty years. He began to notice early symptoms of his disease when he was at the end of his studies at Oxford. He was getting more clumsy, found it difficult to control his movements and fell over several times.
He was awarded numerous distinctions, including twelve honoris causa doctorates, the Order of the British Empire (CBE degree) in 1982, the Prince of Asturias Award for Concord in 1989, the Copley Medal in 2006, the Freedom Medal in 2009, and the BBVA Foundation Frontiers of Knowledge Award in 2015.
In 1979, Hawking returned to the University of Cambridge, where he was appointed to one of the most prestigious teaching positions until his retirement in 2009.
In spite of his physical struggle with his health disability, he was able to set up a family. He was married for the first time in 1965 to Jane Wilde and they had three children. By 1990, their marriage was over and Hawking began a relationship with his nurse, Elaine Mason, whom he married and later divorced.
On March 14, 2018, at the age of 76, he died at his home in Cambridge, England.
Sadly, his disease worsened over the years, leaving him almost completely paralyzed and forcing him to communicate through a voice generator. However, his strong determination led him to overcome

life adversity and make groundbreaking contributions in the field of modern physics, being comparable to the greatest scientists such as Newton and Einstein.







Monarch Queen Elizabeth II was known for her humility and decorum, which earned her respect both domestically and internationally. Besides, she faced numerous personal and public challenges, including family scandals and national crises, with grace and resilience.

However, many people criticized and questioned her for being detached from the public during certain periods. For example, after Princess Diana's tragic death in a car accident in 1997, the Queen remained at Balmoral Castle with her grandsons, Prince William and Prince Harry, for several days. Eventually, the Queen returned to London, addressed the nation in a televised speech, and participated in public mourning, which helped to mitigate some of the criticism. In addition, King Charles described his mother late as 'cold and aloof' during his 'lonely' childhood.

I am Magda and I am from Croatia. My father is a construction foreman and my mother a housewife. I am a senior university student, and I study Geology. After the first COVID-19 case in Zagreb in March 2020, we switched to online education. I went back home to stay with my parents and two sisters. It was a very difficult time as we had to live together during the lockdown. Having online classes while staying with my family affected me badly in every sense. I had to help my mother to do house chores as my sisters were just 5 and 10 years old. All the burden fell on my shoulders since my parents were also working from home. Usually, my father does not do domestic chores unless the rest of the household is all sick. So I had to do almost all the housework, not only preparing meals, washing dishes, cleaning the house, doing laundry, and looking after my younger sisters, but also studying online. It was difficult and exhausting to follow online classes, submit papers, and take exams. I remember times when I was cooking while also trying to respond to exam questions. Due to all that stress, I ended up having physical and psychological health issues. I lost a lot of weight, my stomach got worse, my eyesight diminished, and I had panic attacks. As I was trying to catch up with everything, I had to go to bed late at night and get up early in the morning and I started to have sleep disorders. Consequently, I had to consult a psychiatrist as the pandemic exacerbated my psychological problems. Although I used to get on well with my family, I started to have quarrels with my parents. Besides, online education was another problem. I did not have a computer and our house did not have a stable internet network, so I had to use my phone and its data to download the documents professors shared with us and write my papers and exams. Before the peridemic, I had never failed a course but under those circumstances, my grades dropped considerably. Nevertheless, I motivated myself to continue, thinking that I should complete my education and have my economic independence. It was a hard time for all the students who had to return home and study online.

I am Joy. I am a nurse and I have been working at a hospital in Chicago for fifteen years. During the pandemic, I spent almost the whole day in hospital. I remember it was a really tough time and we had to follow a strict protocol. As part of our preventive measures we had to wear disposable gowns, gloves and a cap. It was rather uncomfortable because after only half an hour you were drenched in sweat and we had to perform our usual tasks in that outfit. If we discovered we were infected with Covid, we stayed in quarantine for fourteen days. We worked, slept, and lived in the red zone for fourteen days with other colleagues, and then we spent fifteen days at home isolated so that we could return to work. We slept in the offices, in the dining room, and in the common rooms and we had prolonged shifts during the day and night. As we could not see our family or friends too often or socialize, it was difficult to cope with work and reduce our anxiety levels and distress. Despite all the challenges we faced during the COVID-19, a strong sense of community and solidarity emerged among hospital workers and the general public. People of all ages expressed their gratitude by writing thank-you notes, sending flowers, delicious desserts and even offering free services such as car repairs, laundry, and more.








Image 83. Chronological order




Image 84. Parts of the story

Food for a community

Every year for many years the people of Milpa Alta, Mexico, have prepared a feast in the week before Christmas. Sixty thousand tamales and 15,000 litres of hot chocolate are made in less than a week, not too much and not too little for the thousands of people who show up for the feast. The feast is called *La Rejunta* and is made for pilgrims preparing for the long walk to the holy cave of *El Señor de Chalma* on January 3rd. The people responsible for organising *La Rejunta* are called the *majordomos*. It's an honour to be chosen and so many people want to do it that the waiting list is full until 2046.

The stages in the organisation of *La Rejunta* are the same every year. Tradition is important to the Milpa Alta people. Corn has been grown here for hundreds of years and the name of the region means 'high cornfield'. Local farmers grow most of the corn, meat, and vegetables needed as ingredients for the meal. And a year before the event, the men go to the forest and collect wood that they pile up high near the home of the *majordomo* so that it will be properly dried before it's used for open-air cooking. This year's *majordomos* are Virginia Meza Torres and her husband Fermín Lara Jiménez. 'There is an infinity of things to do,' Virginia Meza Torres says firmly, as if to indicate there is no time to talk. Virginia is heading to the local offices to get the necessary permits and Fermín sets off into the countryside in search of more ingredients. They leave their daughter Montserrat Lara Meza in charge. She is a 24-year-old graduate student who's come home to help her parents for the week. Volunteers are starting to arrive and Montserrat wanders down the hill to a shed to see how the toasting of the corn is going. Everything is made from the basics – no instant mixes or other culinary shortcuts are allowed.

When the day of *La Rejunta* arrives, the volunteers have been up all night, though no one admits to feeling tired. Fermin has made sure there are enough tamales for everyone, and the head cook has been stirring the atole (chocolate drink) all night. After a 14-year wait, and a full year of preparation, it's almost time for Fermin and Virginia to hand over responsibility to the next *majordomos*. But first, there are thousands of cups of atole to serve.
